Pastor's Page

Now the company of those who believed were of one heart and soul, and no one said that any of the things which he possessed was his own, but they had everything in common. ... There was not a needy person among them. ... (Acts 4:32, 34a)

What happens when we entrust our whole life to God?

Two things: first, our lives come under Divine protection, direction, and care. Second, our trust is assaulted in every available manner by our enemy the devil.

Shortly after the verses above, we encounter Barnabas, who cheerfully entrusted himself to God, sold property, and brought the proceeds to the apostles for their pastoral use in care of the needy. "Barnabas" means "Son of Encouragement," and his act served both to bless the needy and to show others a blessed way of living.

Right after this, though, we meet a married couple, Ananias and Sapphira. These two talked things over and decided they, too, would liquidate property. But they also conspired together to conceal the true sale price, bring only a portion of it to the apostles, and claim this was everything they had received for their land.

You can read for yourself what happened to them in Acts 5.

One of the things that stands out in the account of the early Church is the spirit of trust in God's provident care, and how that trust guided people's actions according to this principle: *Choose to be faithful, and God will take care of everything that comes after.*

"Faithful," of course, means not only "having belief" but also "abiding in devoted ways."

Experience teaches us that a life of devotion comes from a heart which has been changed by God. Apart from this, people may act in ways that appear faithful (see "Ananias and Sapphira") but do not arise from a faithful spirit. When God changes our heart through the power of the Cross of Christ and His Resurrection, the transformation flows outward and is confirmed by our attitudes and priorities, words and deeds, choices and values. The whole person is

affected, because God's Grace *makes us truly* whole.

Part of this "wholeness" is the new spiritual sight through which we view all things—ourselves; others; the world; God; possessions. It's all God's, not ours.

Since God is supremely concerned with human wellbeing, He helps us learn to view what was formerly "ours" in the same light. This is true of things entrusted to us personally, and to things under our communal governance.

Thus, a good question to carry around with us is <u>"How can I use this-or-that</u> to bless? How can I (or we) bring the Acts 4 life of the <u>Church to light today?"</u>

It doesn't have to be complicated; sometimes it's just a matter of using what we have in a fresh way that yields a benefit. **Inside** (page 2) you'll find an example of the Acts Four Spirit in our little corner of the Church of Christ. <u>I'd like to invite</u> you to think, pray and converse together about more ways we can bring this Spirit to life among us. +

The Acts Four Spirit at Work: Using things for good

While Carey and I were on vacation, our daughter and son-in-law suffered a "domestic casualty:" their upright freezer died. While it was, fortunately, still under warranty, the warranty was no help to the rapidly thawing food in the freezer. Some of it spoiled for want of "emergency freezer space."

Messiah has an upright freezer, left behind when the Agency on Aging Adult Daycare operation ended. It's almost empty (in fact we'll soon turn it off to save electricity). But it's here.

So . . . Let's make it useful.


If your freezer quits, and you need "emergency freezer space," bring your food to the church kitchen door and put it in the Messiah upright freezer rear corner of the kitchen) until yours is repaired or replaced.

Obviously you'll have to get inside, and if the freezer is turned off, we'll need to plug it in and cool it.

If you can come during office hours, call the church (272-2922). We'll crank up the freezer and open for you when you come.

If it's at another time, call a key holder: Council members, committee chairs, property committee members. We're a small enough group that you know someone among these church workers, and in the Acts Four Spirit, they'll be glad to help, meet you here, turn down the freezer, and so keep your frozen food safe.

Don't be shy about asking. As a song in *My Fair Lady* says, "The Lord Above made man to help his neigh-



bor." Let your neighbor *be* a neighbor for you when you need one, and so help foster the Acts Four Spirit among us.

And if *your* neighbor's freezer gives up the ghost, you can help them connect with our Acts Four Spirit and save their frozen.

They might even decide they'd like to be part of a congregation which has such a Spirit. That Spirit certainly produced growth in the early Church.



Do you have an Acts Four idea? It will help us all if you share it.

What is an "Acts Four idea?"

It's an idea about how we can use material possessions, either those God has entrusted to us personally, or items around the church, in helpful ways.

Perhaps someone has a temporary need for a couple of card tables. We could publicize the need in the church bulletin, and ask if people might bring a card table or two that the borrower can take along after Sunday worship and then return. This is one simple idea.

If you have an idea, a suggestion for "Acts Four Spirit" ministries, write it on a piece of paper and put it in the offering plate, or call the office during hours (272-2922) and tell us about it.

If you're not sure whether it's a good idea, ask a fellow member what they think. Perhaps a good idea can be refined and made even better.

Or have a conversation among fellow church folks and see what ideas pop up.

No due dates, no deadlines. Good ideas can sprout up anytime. Besides, when the goal is to bless one another, God joins in and helps those ideas sprout. God has been inspiring good ideas from the moment Jesus first said *Love one another*.

May Congregation Council Meeting Highlights

The Messiah Congregation Council met on Tuesday, May 9, 2017.

- Six members and one guest were present; one member was excused.
- Approved the estimate from Blatt & Myers for new LED lighting in the sanctuary to reduce cost and heat.
- The estimate for new LED lighting in the Education Wing was too high and we clarified our needs. Blatt & Myers will be getting back to us with other options.
- The motion & light detector spot light that will be placed outside the kitchen door for safety purposes was approved.
- Approved the monthly financial report be removed from the newsletters and posted on the Information Board quarterly. This report will be simplified for easier understanding.
- Approved the purchase of a new copier and print/maintenance contract with Stratix Systems. Edwards Business Systems (our current copier provider) will be given 30 days notice of termination of contract. The copier will be purchased out of Dorothy Daub's bequest. This change will save us hundreds of dollars per year.
