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From the Desk of Pr. Abera Hellemo

Just as the Lord God called to Adam; "Where are you?" the same God is calling us saying, "Where are you?" God is calling us to have a closer fellowship and relationship so that we might grow in love and service to God.

Let me introduce myself to the church family of Messiah. As you are aware, I came to you as an interim pastor for some time and I am personally appealing to you to be active in faith and life so I can partner with you in carrying out the message of hope and healing in this sin infected, constantly changing, and restless world. I cannot do the work God without your help and please join me in this noble task which God has placed in our hands. Who knows if vou and I exist in time and history for "time such as this?

As an ordained pastor I assume my ministry to be the ministry of Word and Sacrament. I strongly believe that the whole people of God and I are part of the ministry of the baptized. As an ordained pastor, I confess and teach the authoritative and normative character of the Scriptures, as the inspired Word of God and the authoritative source and norm of its proclamation, faith, and life in this restless world. A friend of mine told me a story of a taxi driver. One day, while the taxi driver was on his way to the airport with a passenger, suddenly a car jumped out of a parking space right in front of the taxi driver. The taxi driver slammed on his brakes, skidded, and missed the other car by just an inches. The driver of the other car whipped his head and started yelling at the taxi driver and his passenger. The taxi driver just smiled and waved at the guy. Surprised by the taxi driver's patience and friendliness,

the passenger asked, why did you just do that? Adding to his comments, the passenger said, "This guy almost ruined your car and sent both of us to the hospital."

The taxi driver taught his passenger a remarkable lesson, what he now calls, "The law of the garbage truck." The taxi driver explained that many people are like garbage trucks. They run around with full of garbage, full of frustration, full of anger, and full of disappointment. As their garbage piles up, they need a place to dump it and sometimes they will dump on you. "Therefore," said the taxi driver to his passenger, "don't take it Just smile. personally. wave, wish them well, and move on. Don't take their garbage and spread it to the other people at work, at home, or on the streets.'

The bottom line is that successful people; especially the people of God do not let garbage trucks take over their day. Life is too short to wake up in the morning with regrets. So, my friends, let us love the people who treat you right, pray for the ones who don't. They say, "life is ten percent what make it and ninety percent how you take it!"

May God bless us and help us in our effort to do what is noble and just in His sight.

Death: When a Leader Dies

This article was found at www.preaching.com the day after Pastor Kendall died. It was written by William D. Howden. The name of the deceased pastor in the original article has been changed to Pastor Kendall. Congregation Council president Nick Adams requested this article be included in the newsletter, for it really applies to our situation as a congregation in mourning.

Read Deuteronomy 34:1-12 and Philippians 4:1-9

The situation described in our Old Testament text may sound familiar to you; a religious leader dies before completing the ministry to which he had been called. Deuteronomy 34 recounts the death of Moses, but I could not read this passage without thinking of this congregation, without thinking of the pain you have experienced through the death of your pastor, Barry Kendall.

This account of Moses' death should help us to reflect. Moses had been called by God to lead the people of Israel out of slavery in Egypt, into the promised land. But the people rebelled. God condemned them to wander for forty years in the wilderness, until the rebellious generation died off, before entering the promised land. Just before his death, Moses went up a high mountain, east of the Jordan River. He could look over into the promised land, from the Negev Desert in the south, to the Mediterranean Sea to the west, and on to the far north. He could look into the promised land, the goal he had sought for forty years. He could look into the promised land, but he could not enter it. He died before reaching his goal.

After his death, "The people of Israel wept for Moses in the plains of Moab thirty days." This, I think, is the first thing we should learn from this text: Mourning takes time. Grief is not over in an instant. An opinion poll was taken a few years ago. They asked a group of people how long grief lasted. The average response in that poll was forty-eight hours. Two days. That is totally unrealistic. The people of Israel wept for Moses in the plains of Moab thirty days. That was all they did. They mourned for thirty days. Maybe if we did nothing else for thirty days, we could end our grief in thirty days, but I'm not even sure about that. Psychologists tell us that grief in our society usually lasts about two years, more or less.

Doug Manning tells of a friend whose child died suddenly. The child was brought to the hospital with what seemed a relatively minor ailment, but half an hour later the child was dead. The mother reacted hysterically. Everyone was trying to get her to calm down and "get a hold of herself." Suddenly she stopped and said, "Don't take my grief away from me. I deserve it, and I'm going to have it." (Doug Manning, *Comforting Those Who Grieve*, p. 12).

Even now, months after your pastor's death, you deserve your grief. It is perfectly natural. Don't let anyone take it away from you.

One reason you deserve your grief is that Pastor Kendall was not simply a friend like other friends or an acquaintance like other acquaintances. He was your pastor. He held a special place in your life and in the life of this congregation about which you care. Just as the death of Moses marked the end of an era in the history of Israel, the death of Barry Kendall may well mark the end of an era in this congregation. Because Pastor Kendall has died, things are not the same here anymore. They will not be the same again. A new era will soon begin. Just as it is natural to mourn the loss of Pastor Kendall, it is also normal to be anxious about an unknown future.

At this point, our New Testament reading has a word to say: Paul writes, "Have no anxiety about anything, but in everything, by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which passes all understanding, will keep our hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

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I do not claim to understand prayer, but I believe in praying nonetheless. William Temple, one-time archbishop of Canterbury, said this about prayer: "When I pray, 'coincidences' happen. When I don't, they don't."

Like Israel on the plains of Moab, this congregations stands poised on the brink of a new era. Moses looked ahead into the promised land, but he was not to lead his people there. Someone else would have to do that.

I expect the people were anxious. They knew what Moses had done. They knew what Moses could do. He had been a great leader, and he was sorely missed. The Bible says that "since then, there has not arisen a prophet in Israel like Moses" - none who knew God so intimately; none who worked so many wonders. There had never been another prophet like Moses.

There will never be another pastor just like Barry Kendall. Israel never found another Moses. They did, however, find a Joshua.

Joshua, says our text, "was full of the spirit of wisdom," and Joshua also became a great leader for Israel. Joshua never became another Moses. Israel did not need another Moses. Moses had been a great leader for one era of Israel's history. Joshua became a great leader in the next era. God's people did not need another Moses. What they needed was a Joshua, a different leader, with different skills, for a different era. What they needed was a Joshua, and God provided a Joshua. Moses died, but the future of God's people did not die with him. Moses died, but a new leader led God's people forward into the promised land.

You stand at the threshold of a new era in the life of this church. Unlike Moses, I have not been to the mountaintop to see what the future may hold. I am sure there will be challenges there, just as there were challenges for Israel, even in the promised land. But as we look ahead, I am confident that you will find a pastor to help you meet these challenges. "Have no anxiety about anything, but in everything, by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God."

Feel free to mourn the death of Pastor Barry Kendall. Remember and celebrate his unique

gifts for ministry. But do not be anxious. Your future in in God's hands.

There will never be another Moses. But somewhere out there is a Joshua or a Deborah, a Ruth or a David, prepared by God to lead this congregation into the future.

A Mother's Lasting Legacy of Faith

Shelley and her husband Rod have been my best friends for the last 46 years. Michelle's description of her mother's faith and the expression of her own faith are so compelling that I thought it important to share.

One week ago today, I tucked my mother into bed and said, "I love you." When I woke up Saturday morning, she was with Jesus. Friday evening was the last earthly I love you, the last kiss on the cheek, the last time I would ever be able to look into her eyes and tell her how much I appreciated her.

I am forever grateful that I was able to be with my mother the week before she passed away. She had been battling cancer for over a year, and the last month of her life was marked with a lot of physical signs that her body was losing the battle with cancer.

In God's grace, my siblings and I were able to all gather with my mom and dad for some precious family time, and we spent the next 3 weeks caring for my mom at her home while she was on hospice. It was a gift to have those weeks with my parents, and it was also a privilege to see my mother respond with miraculous grace when her body was falling apart. I never heard a complaint, I never saw anger or hopelessness... Instead I saw joy amidst hardship as she clung to the promises that Jesus would always be with her and take care of her.

Her battle cry during those last days was songs of worship to Jesus; she sang them day and night, and was requesting to sing hymns right up until the evening before she passed away. She truly had her eyes set on Jesus.

Watching the process of my mom dying was one of the most sacred moments of my life. It was evident that the more her body fell apart, the stronger her soul became, through the power of Jesus. It was miraculous! Praise the Lord He forgives our sins and gives us this powerful, death-defeating hope! She was a living testimony of Paul's prayer in Romans 15:13: *"May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope."*

So today, I abound in hope, even though the grief of loss is very raw and real right now. My faith was strengthened as I saw the Lord take care of my mom, over and over again this past year; my understanding of how the Lord "fills us" with joy and peace and hope has been made deeper by watching His work in my mom's life, especially this past month.

One of the phrases my mom said to me a couple of weeks before she died was, "I just want everyone to know how much Jesus loves us," and that phrase has stuck with me, as I have seen how much the love of Jesus transformed her life, even in death.


